Let's Look at Government Efficiency.

Normally when a government or political party speaks about finding efficiencies, paying down debt, or stopping “waste”, that usually means slashing public services and programs and laying off workers.

Why is this the case? Study after study has shown that strong public services reduces inequality and strengthens the economy by providing support to the private sector. Why is cutting good jobs the answer? It's those same jobs that provide the purchasing power to support local businesses.

We have examples from countries around the world showing how austerity reduces economic output, while causing misery to so many.



There are better options that the government could enact right away to save money and protect the services and programs the public needs. In particular, remote work has been proven to increase productivity, improve work-life balance and save billions for the government. It's also better for the environment and lessens congestion across roadways.

Let's also stop all the contracting out, which is more expensive than having the public service take on that work. The federal government spent more than \$19 billion on external contracts and services in 2024-2025, more than double the \$8.5 billion in 2020.

Whether it's the Liberals federally, or the Progressive Conservatives provincially, governments should stop giving lucrative contracts to private companies and put an end to the waste.


